Fun in the Field Opening Event

HWA's annual spring **Fun in the Field** weekend kicks off our season on **April 9-10**th. We'll again gather at Holly Hills Game Preserve, near Chillicothe, OH, to introduce or re-acquaint our Airedales with both fur (as in raccoons) and feather (as in pheasants). While doing that, we'll have time to enjoy being with Airedale friends both old and new.

Our Fun in the Field weekend is designed to be a no-pressure, no-stress (no tests!) weekend, but we do give it some structure to make it worth your while. For those interested, we'll devote a morning to training with a raccoon. We'll show you how to lay a scent trail and encourage your dog to do the three things required to pass a Fur Test: 1) Follow a track; 2) Look UP at the tree to find the caged raccoon; 3) BARK! Sounds easy? Well, a little practice goes a long way for dogs who have no experience in this.

Bridget Bodine's All-Airedale Retrieving Seminar

Building on the success of last year's event, HWA is pleased to again sponsor an **All-Airedale Retrieving Semina**r presented by professional gundog trainer Bridget Bodine. This seminar will take place on **June 9-11, 2017** at Bridget's homebase, DeCoverly Kennels in southeastern Pennsylvania (see www.decoverlykennels.com).

Participants for this training weekend will be limited to 10 Airedales, though more auditors without dogs will be okay. The limit of 10 dogs allows for Bridget to give significant individual coaching time to each dog/handler team. Bridget will use our Airedales to demonstrate how to use an e-collar to train and prompt behaviors from basic obedience to complicated blind retrieves. The sophisticated use of the e-collar, not just as punishment for non-compliant behavior, but rather as a prompt to fast and correct responses is something you could see in a video or read about in a book, but having Bridget walk you through it with your dog has practical results. Dogs will work on land and water with bumpers, chukar and ducks.

Whether you're starting a puppy or have an older dog who's reached a training plateau, this is a seminar for those who are serious about training with finesse to produce a successful hunting companion and hunt test dog. One requirement: bring your sense of humor, since training with Airedales always brings outbreaks of spontaneous laughter. Bridget has our terriers' number and knows how to play it.

This year's **HWA Airedale Field Nationals** takes place on **September 8-10**th at Holly Hills Game Preserve, near Chillicothe, OH. We're returning to our favorite place and the hospitality of Holly Hills owners Dean and Marsha Hatfield to bring you another three-day event full of Airedale activities for newcomers and experienced dogs.

If you've never been to an HWA Nationals, there's plenty for your pups and inexperienced Airedales to do, including a Hunting Instinct Test, Barkathon and Pocket Quail Fun Contest. Dawn Schuster, an AKC Upland judge who will also be judging our HWA Upland Test, will again present her popular entry-level training seminar for dogs and owners who aren't ready for hunt tests.

This year the ATCA Hunting/Field team will be holding an **Airedale Retrieving Olympics** on Friday afternoon (May 19th). This is a fun competition of retrieving skills, such as speed bumper drills and fastest land and water retrieves, offering Gold, Silver and Bronze prizes. In addition, they'll have some tests and activities for pups and non-trained dogs. Sounds like crazy fun!


All that, and we haven't raised our dues for years. You *should* be a member!

Fur vs. Feather

Recently we had an interesting discussion on HWA's Facebook site. One of our FB commenters noted that our HWA site mostly features Airedales as bird dogs. He pointed out that from the early 1900s to about the mid 1980s, Airedales were best known for handling varmints and big game. Why are we pushing Airedales as bird dogs, he wondered?

In reply, we posted a number of photos of Airedales working raccoons on the ground and in tree training in this year's events. It's clear from the photos that Airedales still have an interest in fur tackling.



But we also agreed that in HWA's 30+ years, we've seen a decline in the number of *owners* actively using their Airedales for fur hunting. Perhaps fewer people are living a country life that gives them access and reason to chase varmints. Maybe there's more concern of rabies in game, or perhaps there's fear of disapproval from animal rights people. For whatever reasons, the everyday use of dogs for fur hunting seems to be a diminishing activity in most parts of the country.

However, HWA and our breed's parent club, the ATCA, are committed to preserving the capability of Airedales for tracking and tackling fur. To that end, HWA events, as well as ATCA parent club fur tests, are designed to give Airedales an introduction to raccoon work; teach owners how to lay track; and then we test the

dog's abilities. We do this for the same reason that herding breed clubs hold herding trials, even though a tiny minority of herding dogs actually tend flocks nowadays. Likewise, we see the Newfoundland club holding water life-saving tests for their dogs, even though few Newfs need that skill anymore. HWA and our breed's parent club hold Airedale Fur Tests to keep alive that part of our breed's heritage.

We do this [hold Fur Tests] for the same reason that herding breed clubs hold herding trials, even though a tiny minority of herding dogs actually tend flocks nowadays.

It may seem like HWA is "pushing" Airedales as bird dogs, but then again, there are numerous opportunities for bird hunting. Some Airedalers take advantage of AKC and HRC hunt tests, and others use game preserves or public lands for pheasant hunting. This is an organized sport. From our Facebook discussions, we've heard from owners who still use Airedales on mountain lion, bear, coyotes, trap lines, or wounded deer tracking, but the owners who do this are mostly on their own.

We've seen that many Airedales still have the grit to track and tackle fur, and those same dogs will bring in pheasants and waterfowl. That versatility is a key feature of our breed, and we'll work to promote and preserve it.



Website Wealth

HWA's website at www.huntingworkingairedales.com is designed as a **rich reference resource** of information on the Airedale as a hunting and working dog. It takes some browsing around in it to realize just how much you can find out.

For instance, as well as the standard histories of Airedales and our club, we post reports and photos of our events to take you there (virtually). Dig deeper into the marked catalog of our Nationals, and you can find the record of dogs who were entered, how they ran, and note a pattern of breeders and bloodlines.

annually to showcase the achievements of

breeder information so that anyone researching
the breed or looking to acquire a pup will have a
good starting point.

Dig deeper into that section to find a **listing** of all Airedales (to the best of our knowledge) with Hunt Test titles in the US since HWA started its titling program in 1994. Our list now includes 145 Airedales with hunt titles issued by HWA, the AKC, HRC (UKC), ATCA and GLSDA (that last is Great Lakes Sporting Dog Assoc). Have a look at the **FAQ section** that offers tips on getting started, or check out the **Breeders' Referral** page if you're looking for a pup. Last but not least, at the risk of being called "cluttered," we've loaded our website with lots of **photos of Airedales in the field**. Our intent is to show that there's 'way more than just a few Airedales in the field, and all of them look like they're having the time of their lives. And we hope that will be the first thing you notice.

Winter Training Tip

Mushers' Secret, longused by Husky owners Up North to protect their dogs' feet from ice and snow, is also a good protective product for hunting dogs in deep winter snow. A thick coating of the balm on foot pads prevents snow clots between toes. It also prevents irritation from street salt. Available on Amazon or dog supply stores.
